Mr. Carter will share his motivational and inspirational story of how to overcome what may seem to be insurmountable obstacles in life.

Described as one of the best political reporters in New York television today, Dominic Carter has been a fixture in the industry for the last 25 years. The former host of NY1 TV's "Inside City Hall," he can currently be seen on RNN TV, where he serves as a Political Commentator on the 2012 Presidential Race.

Mr. Carter has also authored a powerful book on his life, "No Momma's Boy," chronicling his triumphant struggle to overcome his mother's mental illness while growing up in a Bronx Housing Project.

During his TV tenure, Mr. Carter has interviewed top local, national and international figures from Michael Bloomberg to President Bill Clinton to Nelson Mandela. He and Ted Koppel were the only New York journalists to interview Mandela during his historic 1990 trip to US. He made international news when then-Senator Hillary Clinton admitted, for the first time, that she was considering a run for the presidency during a debate that he was moderating.

Dominic Carter has been featured in numerous publications, including Jet magazine, and has appeared on shows such as *Face the Nation*, *Hardball with Chris Matthews*, and on various shows on *CNN* and the *Fox News Channel*.

As a youngster growing up in the Bronx, Carter was involved with the Police Athletic League, and today is proud to call himself a PAL kid. In his free time, he often speaks to youth groups about the importance of education and achievement. He has received the Samuel P. Peabody Award from the Citizens' Committee for Children, for his vision, innovation and dedication to children and families. He has also received an honorary doctorate from Medgar Evers College
